19 Wing Comox signs on to Comox Valley Fire and Rescue



19 Wing Comox Fire
Department has recently
signed onto the Comox
Valley Fire and Rescue
Services Memorandum of
Understanding (MOU). The
MOU, which has been in
effect among many central
island communities for
several years, provides for

assistance on a costrecovery basis.

Through the MOU, fire services personnel hope to strengthen the bonds between the fire departments and make better use of local resources as they work together to save lives, protect property and

preserve the environment. The MOU allows local fire departments to benefit from specialized equipment found in other jurisdictions, as well as cooperate in the event of a situation involving multiple fires that may quickly exhaust the abilities of one fire department.

Fire Services taking part in the MOU include: the Comox Valley Regional District (Denman Island, Hornby Island, Fanny Bay, Black Creek/Oyster River), Courtenay, Comox, Cumberland, Union Bay, Ships Point, Campbell River and 19 Wing Comox.

COMOX Totes NOVEMBER 15, 2014

It's election year again for local government in BC, and preparations are well under way in Comox. Electors will be voting for one mayor, six councillors and one school district trustee this fall, who will hold office for four years. General voting day is Saturday November 15, 2014 at the Comox Recreation Centre, 1855 Noel Avenue, between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.

Once again this year, we will be using the Provincial Voters' List from Elections BC as the Town's list of registered electors. If you were registered with Elections BC before July 1st, you will automatically be placed on the Town's List.

Those who are not on the Voters' List may still register in advance of the election as long as you do so by Tuesday September 23rd. Please see our website at

http://comox.ca/hall/municipal-elections/2014-election for the registration form. After September 23rd, you will only be able to register at the time that you come in to vote.

Please remember, if you have a physical disability, illness or injury that affects your ability to vote at the voting places, or if you expect to be out of town during all voting opportunities, you can request a mail ballot voting package.

Fire Department prepares for interface fires

At the edges of Town, where residential homes meet the surrounding forest, the Comox Fire Department has to be ready for interface fires (fires which put people and communities at risk). Recently they practiced setting up and using special sprinkler systems, which can wet down surrounding homes and land if an interface fire is approaching. If they can get to a property in time and wet it down, a fire that is moving at a slow to medium speed is likely to move around the wet property.

This technique was adopted province-wide after the 2003 Okanagan Mountain (Kelowna) interface fire. Comox has a number of these sprinkler systems ready to deploy, if required.

Before an interface fire breaks out, there are steps that home owners should take to minimize the risk: clear your roof and gutters of dry leaves, needles and twigs, remove unmanaged vegetation or other fuel sources from within 10 metres of your home, be careful about leaving anything hot near flammable materials, and do not light any fires or have open flames when the fire risk is high.

Our Fire Chief Gord Schreiner warns that the Fire Department is very concerned about the hot dry weather. We do not want to be fighting a major forest fire in our area. We need the public's help to keep Comox safe from fires.



Beware of "soaker" hoses

Despite its name, a "soaker" hose can use much more water than people might think. Each hose, run with a tap on at full pressure, can use as much as 400 litres of water per hour. As some people leave them running for many hours (or even days) at a time, this can add up to a huge amount of water used. For example, if run for many days, each day (24 hour period) would consume 9.6 cubic metres.

Please remember that soaker hoses are an irrigation system, and can only be operated during the hours and days designated by the current watering stage that we are in. They should be used in accordance with the water use bylaw, either by hand or by timer, otherwise home-owners may be ticketed.

We encourage anyone using a soaker hose to run it at low pressure, or use a pressure-reducing valve or disc. Water should slowly seep, not squirt, from the pores and if you can hear the water running through, then you are using more water than needed.


Comox spends over \$1.4 million per year on water. This is the largest expense of our water system and we encourage all to conserve water, in order to keep rates low.

Beaufort Greenway

Last fall, the Town purchased two parcels of land at 1988 Beaufort Avenue, across from Port Augusta Park and Carthew Street. The parcels contain a portion of Carthew Creek, and it is the Town's intent to dedicate a portion as parkland.

In accordance with the Official Community Plan, the land surrounding Carthew Creek has been identified for future greenway trail development, connecting a proposed waterfront walkway, Port Augusta Park and Beaufort Avenue to the Anderton Road / Comox Avenue intersection.


The two parcels are now in the process of being resubdivided in order to create the parkland plus two infill parcels. Greenway trail development will occur at a future time.

Brooklyn Creek channel enhancement



Over the past several years, the Town, along with many local organizations, has been involved with the Brooklyn Creek Channel Enhancement Project. This Project has the aim of increasing the productivity of wild salmon stocks in the Brooklyn Creek as well as improving pedestrian access along the Creek and within Town parks.

This year, channel enhancement will occur along a 370 metre section of Brooklyn Creek within Salish Park. The work will include the reconstruction of six rock riffles, which are short, relatively shallow and coarse-graveled lengths that reduce upstream slope and velocity, and increase downstream oxygen levels. A 185 metre section of trail along the Creek will also be resurfaced as part of this project. The development of engineering designs to restore a 278 metre offchannel section in lower Brooklyn Creek, and the realignment of an estimated 165 metre section of trail, will also be completed.

How much is enough?



How much water does your lawn really need? It is generally accepted that one inch (25 mm) of water per week is enough. If you water more than once per week, then use only a fraction of an inch each time (for instance, 1/3 inch or 8 mm if you water three times weekly).

Since every irrigation system is different, the only way to know how long to run your sprinklers is to use a gauge to measure how much your system applies per hour.

Please also remember to check the Town's website for the days and times that you are able to water.
